As an optician, you'll fit customers for glasses and contact lenses according to their prescription from an optometrist. You may also be responsible for grinding lenses to fit frames, assembling glasses, and repairing or adjusting completed eye glasses.

DAY IN THE LIFE



As an optician, you will work wherever eyeglasses and contact lenses are sold including medical offices and retail stores. As such, you'll have the opportunity to work in a variety of settings.



Most opticians work 40 hours per week, though part-time opportunities are also available in stores that have evening hours. Depending on the type of office or store you work in, you may have a flexible schedule that includes weekends and nights.

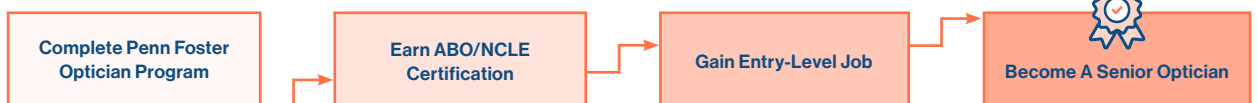
